## **Developing Partnerships**



## Describe any partnership gaps with your CAT and how you could improve!

- Relationship with the RCMP seems to be working well in other CATs and may be an opportunity.
- Being able to bring in people who are actively using.
- There are a lot of people engaged through strategies like mailing lists, but **deeper engagement** like coming to meetings, can be more challenging.
- There are pros and cons to virtual vs in person meetings, and may be potential through **hybrid meetings**, though these can also be challenging. Meeting in person is challenging without funding to support.
- Grad students can be great assets for moving work forward
- There are so many overlaps between people who use substances, with homelessness, mental health, and other systems – there can be different groups for different discussions. There are political conversations to be had, as well as a need for 'underground' conversations to generate and push forward an agenda to then influence policy.

## Gaps:

- **Peers** word of mouth; in-person meetings, honorarium.
- **Service providers** seconded due to covid.
- City involved but don't sit at table
- First responders
- Peer engagement (peer is an individual with life experience with addictions all addictions on all levels) lead into employment.
- Peers engaging with the public, reduces stigma.
- Strong need for harm reduction. **Peers working in harm reduction**. Operate famers market booth. All have naloxone training and train the trainer training.
- Pilot project from Fraser Health, remove naloxone program, peer based with peer speakers
- Peers know what other peers want.
- Gaps: Creating committees fair number of people join but need more outreach to get more participation sometimes people only show up but do not do much.
- Create working groups to be a subcommittee
- Langley has a lot of peer involvement basically peer based been around since 2016 come a long way 9 peers involved police fire ambulance doctors & businesses show up, work with lookout doing a survey, rigg riders, pickup needles, IOAD event, want to be able to operate their team on their own want to do more community engagement and teaching, work with many other organizations rigg riders doesn't pay minimum wage, have a lot of barriers with the municipality (police & bylaw) they go overboard stigma is turning into hate crime, overwhelming barrier
- Trail needs more funding not a funded CAT need more involvement with RCMP, First Responders & IH
- Gaps small community inconsistent 'showing up' get better at sending zoom links create better
  consistency with attendance and participation how do we fix that? Creating event? 10% who show up and
  do the work.
- **Defining roles at the CAT** might help small community and folks have dual roles/organizations which hat are they wearing?

- Individually connect with folks reach out and meet
- Connection not just content is helpful create tasks for the worker bees
- Surrey/White Rock Semiahoo First Nations
- Gap of not knowing what the gaps are **not being fully informed, suggestion of more information in public spaces** rather than just email chains (harder to access with limited technology etc), make meeting recaps more accessible to peers to keep in the loop (Comox Valley CAT peers)
- Municipal leaders, council members people who can make the changes and help gather community support if they were there the community would likely follow along and be more open (Langely CAT rep)
- Semihamoo First Nations struggled to have representation on our CAT from the First Nations although having
  a few Indigenous peers but want to build better connections with Semihamoo First Nations (South
  Surrey/Whiterock CAT rep)
- Gap/lack of peer involvement (especially people using alone) getting a grant to start a peer support network and hire a peer coordinator has made such a difference. She has lead.
- Gap of connection, working relationship with RCMP (Comox Valley CAT)
