### 6 Questions to Ask

- 1 Where did the information come from?
- 2 Do the claims seem reasonable?
- 3 Is the information up-to-date?
- 4 Is this a trustworthy source of information?
- 5 Is the information based on scientific research?
- 6 Does the information seem to present an unbiased point of view?
